D 079	<p>10A NCAC 13F .0306(a)(5) Housekeeping and Furnishings</p> <p>10A NCAC 13F .0306 Housekeeping and Furnishings (a) Adult care homes shall (5) be maintained in an uncluttered, clean and orderly manner, free of all obstructions and hazards; This Rule shall apply to new and existing facilities.</p> <p>This Rule is not met as evidenced by: TYPE B VIOLATION</p> <p>Based on observations and interviews, the facility failed to prevent the use of non-surge protected electric outlet adapters in 3 of 39 occupied resident rooms (Rooms A-1, A-9 and B-9).</p> <p>The findings are:</p> <p>Observation on 5/10/16 at 10:12AM of Room A-9 revealed: -A six plug electric outlet adapter, located in the outlet next to the bed, with 4 devices plugged into it. -One of the plugs was white and came from a surge protector, into which was plugged in a cell phone charger and an oil-filled space heater (the space heater was off). -One of the plugs was from a bedside table lamp (off).</p>	D 079

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D 079	<p>Continued From page 1</p> <p>-A black plug came from a small fan on the bedside table (off). -The source of the fourth plug (black in color) was not determined.</p> <p>Observation on 5/10/16 at 10:45AM of Room A-1 revealed: -A three outlet electric adapter behind a bedside stand with a table lamp plugged into it and turned on.</p> <p>Observation on 5/10/16 at 11:15AM of Room B-9 revealed: -A three outlet adapter plugged into an outlet near the resident's bed. -Into the adapter was plugged a night light, a humidifier and a hearing aid device. -The night light and humidifier were both turned on. -Into the free wall outlet was plugged a cell phone charger.</p> <p>Confidential interviews with one resident revealed a family member had brought in the electric outlet adapter she was using.</p> <p>Telephone interview with the Maintenance Director on 5/10/16 at 2:20PM revealed: -He had been in his position for three weeks. -He was shared between this facility and a "sister" facility, 2 days at one facility and 3 days at the other each week, alternating each week. -He did not provide any safety training to staff during orientation other than addressing fire drills, alarm resets, use of the wheelchair lift in the transport vehicle and maintaining a secured setting for the special care unit. -He would expect the Resident Care Director or Executive Assistant to report any safety concerns to him.</p>	D 079

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D 079	<p>Continued From page 2</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>-The facility did not use outlet adapters and if anything was used, it should be a surge protector.</li> <li>-Residents and family members were told to not use outlet adapters and to only use surge protectors (he did not say who in the facility provided these instructions).</li> <li>-He was "pretty sure" Medication Aides, Personal Care Aides and Housekeepers knew to report the use of outlet adapters if they were found.</li> </ul> <p>Interviews with the Executive Director and the Director of Clinical Services on 5/10/16 at 4:00PM revealed:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>-Outlet adapters had to be "UL [Underwriter's Laboratory] approved" and extension cords were not permitted for use.</li> <li>-Not all residents tell them what they do in their rooms.</li> <li>-The facility has had lots of staff turnover and probably did not know the outlet adapters were considered hazards.</li> </ul> <p>Review of the most current fire inspection report for the facility dated 8/5/15 revealed:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>-A check mark next to "good" for the category of "interior of building/electrical."</li> <li>-A check mark next to the category of "proper use of extension cords."</li> </ul> <p>_____</p> <p>A Plan of Protection was provided on 5/10/16 and included:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>-All hazardous outlet adapters would be removed by facility management by the end of the day on 5/10/16.</li> <li>-Facility management would perform frequent inspections of all rooms to ensure no hazardous outlet adapters were present.</li> <li>-Facility staff would receive training on company policy regarding outlet adapters not to be allowed in the facility.</li> </ul>	D 079

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D 108	<p>Continued From page 4</p> <p>surge protector that was plugged directly into a wall outlet. -A small desk lamp (also off) was plugged into the surge protector.</p> <p>Observation on 5/10/16 at 10:45AM of Room A-1 revealed: -A small radiant space heater with a fan (off), sitting on top of plastic drawers and plugged into a six outlet adapter with no surge protection. -A small radiant space heater with a fan (off), sitting on the floor by the door.</p> <p>Observation on 5/10/16 at 11:00AM of Room B-7 revealed an oil-filled radiator space heater in the room.</p> <p>Observation on 5/10/16 at 11:30AM of Room C-14 on the special care unit revealed: -An oil-filled radiator space heater on the floor near the bedroom door. -It was plugged into an outlet and turned on.</p> <p>An interview with the resident who occupied Room C-14 on 5/10/16 at 11:30AM revealed: -He was oriented to person, place, and time. -He had been waiting for staff to assist him with a bath and had the heater was on to warm the room.</p> <p>Observation on 5/10/16 at 1:58PM of the Marketing Office revealed: -Windows to the office permitted viewing of the office from the hallway. -The office was not occupied. -An oil-filled radiator space heater was visible inside the office by the door and unplugged.</p> <p>Observation on 5/10/16 at 2:00PM of Room A-9 revealed:</p>	D 108

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D 108	<p>Continued From page 5</p> <p>-A 6 plug electric outlet adapter, located in the outlet next to her bed.</p> <p>-One of the plugs into the adapter came from a surge protector, into which was plugged in a cell phone charger and an oil-filled radiator space heater (off).</p> <p>Observation on 5/10/16 at 2:05PM of Room A-15 revealed an oil-filled radiator space heater, plugged into the wall from under a desk (off).</p> <p>Observation on 5/10/16 at 2:15PM of Room B-2 revealed an oil-filled radiator space heater in the corner of the room (off).</p> <p>Observation on 5/10/16 at 2:20PM of Room B-10 revealed an oil-filled radiator space heater at the foot of the resident's bed, plugged in (off).</p> <p>Observation on 5/10/16 at 2:32PM of Room D-7 revealed an oil-filled radiator space heater in the bathroom, partially pushed under the vanity counter and not plugged in.</p> <p>Observation on 5/10/16 at 2:56PM of Room D-4 revealed an oil-filled radiator space heater, plugged in (off).</p> <p>Observation on 5/10/16 at 2:57PM of Room D-15 revealed an oil-filled radiator space heater behind a recliner and not plugged in.</p> <p>Observation on 5/10/16 at 2:58PM of Room D-3 revealed an oil-filled radiator space heater plugged in (off).</p> <p>Observation on 5/10/16 at 2:59PM of Room D-2 revealed an oil-filled radiator space heater plugged in (off).</p>	D 108

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D 108	<p>Continued From page 6</p> <p>Confidential interviews with 13 residents revealed:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>-Staff had provided one resident with a space heater but it had not been used recently.</li> <li>-In the winter, one resident used a space heater because the "thermostat" was broken in the wall heater/air conditioning unit, which he had spoken to the "Maintenance Man" concerning.</li> <li>-One family member was supposed to take back a space heater no longer being used.</li> <li>-One resident used her space heater when it was cold in the morning.</li> <li>-One resident stated the wall heater/air conditioning unit "doesn't work for heat," he used the space heater at night on a low setting, he shut it off every time he left his room and "I'm afraid the space heater might be a fire hazard."</li> <li>-One resident did not have a space heater currently in their room but used one during the winter.</li> <li>-One resident stated it "got pretty cold in the winter time" and "I don't think the window heater works anymore."</li> <li>-One resident "used recently" a space heater on cold days "just to knock the chill off."</li> <li>-One resident had a space heater before she got a new roommate, which was used in the winter, but staff took it away as the roommate thought the room was too warm.</li> <li>-One resident stated they did not use the space heater in their room but a roommate did use it.</li> <li>-One resident stated they used a space heater in the winter.</li> <li>-One resident stated they used a space heater to warm their room up, the room got chilly without it but they never left it on while they slept.</li> <li>-One resident used a space heater when it got cold, the window heating/air conditioning unit did not work and she wore a sweater "all the time."</li> </ul>	D 108		

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D 108	<p>Continued From page 7</p> <p>Confidential interview with a Personal Care Aide on the Special Care Unit revealed: -Hazards in rooms included oxygen tubing, walkers and wheelchairs and blow dryers in bathrooms. -Concerning space heaters, "they [residents] have them, I think" and the one in Resident #3's room was probably "not safe."</p> <p>Confidential interview with a second Personal Care Aide on the Assisted Living side of the facility revealed she always made sure there was nothing near the residents heaters.</p> <p>Telephone interview with the Maintenance Director on 5/10/16 at 2:20PM revealed: -He had been in his position for three weeks. -He was shared between this facility and a "sister" facility, 2 days at one facility and 3 days at the other each week, alternating each week. -He did not provide any safety training to staff during orientation other than addressing fire drills, alarm resets, use of the wheelchair lift in the transport vehicle and maintaining a secured setting for the special care unit. -He would expect the Resident Care Director or Executive Assistant to report any safety concerns to him. -Space heaters could be used on the assisted living side of the facility but not in the special care unit. -Use of space heaters was determined based on the county the facility was located in. -The window heating/air conditioning units provided heat through hot water piped through them, which was shut off and turned on by a valve under each unit and done so seasonally. -The facility started in May to "turn over" the heating/air conditioning units from heat to air conditioning.</p>	D 108		

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D 108	<p>Continued From page 8</p> <p>-When the heating/air conditioning units were "turned over" was based on resident preference.</p> <p>-Residents used space heaters at night because it was cooler then, but he was not sure if the heating/air conditioning units in these rooms had been turned over yet.</p> <p>Interview with the Executive Director and the Director of Clinical Services on 5/10/16 at 4:00PM revealed:</p> <p>-The facility had been open since 2008 and there was not a written policy regarding the use of space heaters.</p> <p>-The heating/air conditioning units in the rooms did not put out sufficient heat during cold periods and the facility obtained the safest space heaters.</p> <p>-Only oil-filled space heaters were used.</p> <p>Review of the most current fire inspection report for the facility dated 8/5/15 revealed no check mark next to the category of "portable unvented heaters."</p> <p>Attempted telephone interview with the Fire Marshall on 5/11/16 at 12:20PM was unsuccessful.</p> <p>_____</p> <p>A Plan of Protection was provided on 5/10/16 and included:</p> <p>-All space heaters would be removed by facility management by the end of the day on 5/10/16.</p> <p>-Facility management would perform frequent inspections of all rooms to ensure no space heaters were present.</p> <p>-Facility staff would receive training on company policy regarding space heaters not to be allowed in the facility.</p> <p>THE CORRECTION DATE FOR THIS TYPE B VIOLATION SHALL NOT EXCEED JUNE 25,</p>	D 108
